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Announcing ESPINODE Ireland

The European Commission awarded the Centre for Software Engineering the contract for managing a new project called ESPINODE Ireland to support process improvement in the software community in Ireland (North and South), which will run for 2 years from 1st May 1998. ESPINODE Ireland will provide a range of general services to the software community, as well as providing special services to those who are undertaking, or have undertaken, EU funded Process Improvement Experiments (PIEs). The Software Industry Federation will assist in delivering the services in Northern Ireland. We expect these general services to include the following:

 Disseminating software process improvement (SPI) experience through workshops and mailings. We will organise free public 'PIE Showcase' seminars every 6 months, at which Irish and overseas PIEs will present their experience, and distribute free 'Resource Packs' each quarter summarising valuable information about selected SPI themes.

 Maintaining an 'Irish Directory of SPI Resources', accessible through the World Wide Web, and organising a local SPI Email discussion group.

The directory will contain listings of useful SPI resources, including references to public domain information, classified listings of trainers and consultants in Ireland who can support your SPI efforts, and an events diary.

 Providing a 'Software Process Training Brokerage' service. We will survey software process training needs, and use moderated email services to stimulate the market for public training, making it easier for training consumers to get details of courses meeting their needs, and easier and cheaper for training providers to reach interested consumers. Unlike the earlier ESPITI project, training delivery will not be subsidised.

Associate Members of CSE will be notified automatically when these services become available. The SPIRE project has reached important the next stage. Those **Companies** that successfully completed the Initiation Phase and submitted Project Plans for approval have now been evaluated. From the 20 original applicants, 14 companies have been offered funding and have been, or are process of being, contracted for the Improvement and Dissemination phases.

Many of the Improvement Projects have already started and the participants will shortly attending a Regional Participant Workshop to share their experience as work gets underway. The time scales are tight but everyone is very committed to completing their projects in the time allowed. The Mentors have also been contracted to carry out the next stage of mentoring with the successful companies.

Work has also started on the deliverables from the SPIRE

project including the **Best Practice Guide** which will
provide practical guidance
based on real experience in
SSDs. The guide will be used
across Europe by other SSDs
embarking on improvement
projects. The **Case Studies**will be developed at the end of
the Improvement Projects in
late August.

The programme combines classroom training with individual assistance. CSE will also carry out a pre-assessment audit to ensure that your organisation complies with the standard, before you seek certification from an external body, if that is what you choose to do.

Implementing a Quality System and achieving certification by the cluster method affords many benefits. You will have the support of the group which will allow mutual sharing of experiences as the programme unfolds. To ensure that each organisation achieves its targets, the number of places on the cluster is limited to 10 organisations employing 30 or less IT staff.

The course is registered with FÁS - The Training and Employment Authority may grant aid attendance on this training programme by qualified applicants under the FÁS Training Support Scheme.

DSDM in Ireland

The Dynamic Systems Development Method (DSDM) is a Rapid Application Development (RAD) method. It was first launched in January 1995 in the UK and is available in the public domain. It is now in use in organisations throughout Europe, the USA and Australia.

DSDM recommends the application of a series of principles, which provide a fast and effective way to develop systems within limited deadlines and manpower resources. However, it is primarily a framework, or 'methodology' rather than a method populated with full set of products/deliverables. It can be used on its own or conjunction with a structured or in-house method, in which the techniques of detailed the method existing may selectively applied to implement DSDM.

Due to the growing interest shown in DSDM in Ireland, the Centre for Software Engineering has established the Irish DSDM User Group in collaboration with the DSDM Consortium in the UK.

The objectives of this User Group are to:

- Collate experiences and good practices in DSDM usage
- Promote the effective use of DSDM

- Assist in the dissemination of information regarding DSDM
- Act as a support group for new and potential members of the DSDM Consortium

DSDM User Group meetings will be held every 3 months. These afternoon meetings will include presentations on aspects of practical experiences of DSDM, followed by a discussion session.

Irish **DSDM** User Group meetings are an excellent opportunity for individuals and organisations that have interest in RAD, to gain and share significant information, and to make contact with other organisations with a similar interest in these methods.

The last User Group meeting included representation from 10 organisations. A survey of participant needs was undertaken with regard to establishing the importance of various topics associated with DSDM. The top five topics among the participants were identified as follows:

- Estimating
- JAD Workshops
- Project Management & Planning
- Configuration Management
- Requirements Management

These topics could become the focus for future User Group meetings. Other topics that

might be addressed in future meetings could include aspects of DSDM such as Timeboxing or Teamwork. Also, if anyone is willing to present his or her experiences of DSDM at these meetings, we would be delighted to hear from you.

In addition to the User Group meetings, we have established an electronic mailing list for the discussion of DSDM topics. If you wish to be added to this list please contact us.
